## **DUAL ENROLLMENT**

The partnerships Quincy College has developed with school systems help to make the transition from secondary to postsecondary education seamless. Dual enrollment provides high school students with the opportunity to earn college credit from Quincy College, while they are still in high school. Quincy College works with the high schools to make sure that the courses taught in the high school are equivalent to QC courses. Dual enrollment registrations are projected to reach 450 this year along with the number of partnerships that increased from thirteen to seventeen with the addition of Randolph High School, Hingham High School, The Woodward School for Girls, and Scituate High School.

## **CAREER VOCATIONAL & TECHNICAL EDUCATION (CVTE) PATHWAY PROGRAMS**

Quincy College has a strong partnership with the Quincy Public Schools (QPS). In addition to the dual enrollment courses at both Quincy and North Quincy High Schools, Quincy College and QPS have worked together to align the CVTE program curriculum at the high schools with specific Quincy College courses. Currently the College offers the following pathway programs between Quincy College and QPS:

- Early Education and Care
- Legal and Protective Services
- Business Technology

High school students enrolled in these programs who maintain a grade-point average (GPA) of 2.7 or higher and continue in their CVTE program throughout high school, had the opportunity to earn Quincy College credit for specific courses that are aligned with the following degree programs:

- Early Childhood Education
- Criminal Justice
- Computer Science
- Business

The College and high schools look forward to continued collaboration to help promote post-secondary opportunities and success for all CVTE students.

## **EARLY COLLEGE HIGH SCHOOL PATHWAY**

Beginning in Summer 2020, Quincy College and QPS began developing an Early College High School (ECHS) program. Given the strong, collaborative partnership between Quincy College and QPS, creating an ECHS program was a natural next step to better support high needs' high school students. QC is in the middle of the third full year of ECHS, enrollment has increased from 204 Quincy HS students in Fall 2022 to 240 in Fall 2023. Enrollment will continue to grow as ECHS extends to Grade Nine starting Fall 2024, with a projected increase of 50 students.



## **Admissions and Enrollment**

## HIGH SCHOOL RECRUITMENT

The Office of Admissions recruits from a variety of populations. With the shift in local demographics, recruitment strategies are deployed to maintain enrollment. The strength of the College’s partnerships is in providing students a seamless transition from high school to college.

The table below identifies the top 20 high schools based on the number of high school graduates entering Quincy College for the *first time*, from Fall 2019 to Fall 2023.

## FALL APPLICANTS, ADMITS, NEW ENROLLEES

The mission of Quincy College includes open access to higher education in order to help students realize their professional and educational futures. As such, the vast majority of students who apply are accepted at Quincy College (consistently over 90%).

Selective degree and certificate programs with fall starts are also included in the table below. Medical Laboratory Technician, Nursing, Practical Nursing, Physical Therapist Assistant, and Surgical Technology\* are all selective programs with fall starts.

The five-year range of students enrolling after being accepted is 43%-51%. In Fall 2023, 46% of students enrolled after being accepted.

The AS in Radiologic Technology program is not included because it begins each spring.

## TOP TWENTY FEEDER CITIES AND TOWNS

The following top five cities enrolled 45% of all QC students: Quincy, Weymouth, Dorchester, Boston, and Plymouth. Quincy has consistently been the top feeder city for QC enrollments from fall 2019 – fall 2023. In fact, Quincy has continued to make up a larger part of overall fall enrollment, from 19% in Fall 2019 to 26% in Fall 2023.

The table below also shows shifts over time. Enrollment from Plymouth decreased from 230 (Fall 2019) to 124 (Fall 2023). There are significant gains in towns such as Milton, from 45 in Fall 2019 to 111 in Fall 2023.

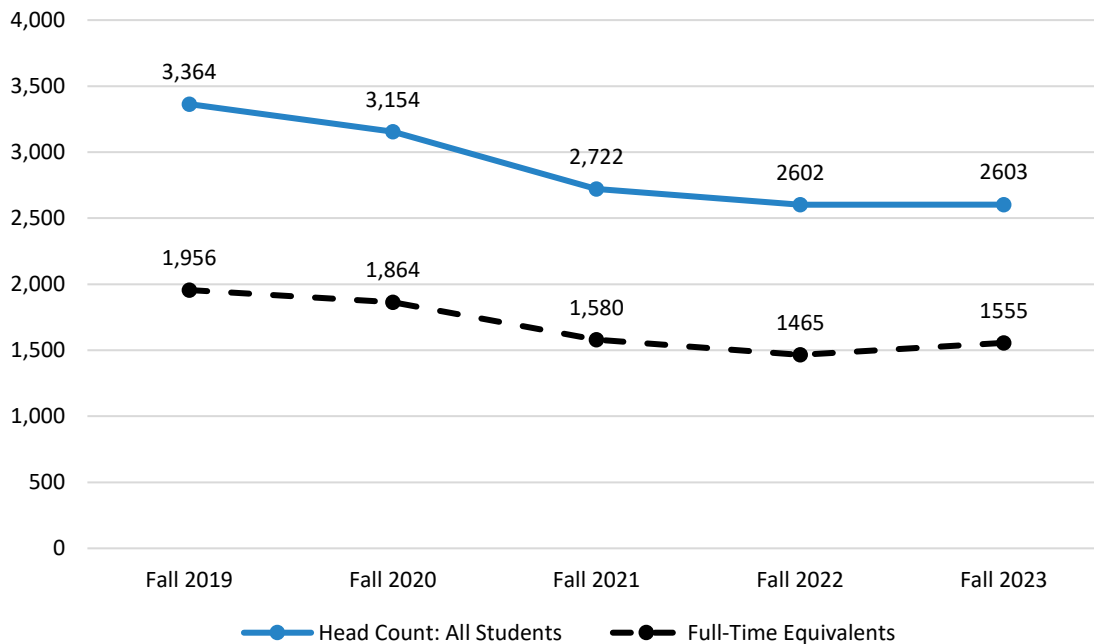

## FALL ENROLLMENT: HEAD COUNT AND FULL TIME EQUIVALENT STUDENTS

Fall enrollment has begun to stabilize based on IPEDS enrollment data (October 15<sup>th</sup> census). While actual unduplicated headcount remained level between Fall 2022 and Fall 2023, full-time equivalent, or FTE increased. This indicated that students are taking more credits. FTE is calculated by the number of credits generated divided by 15.

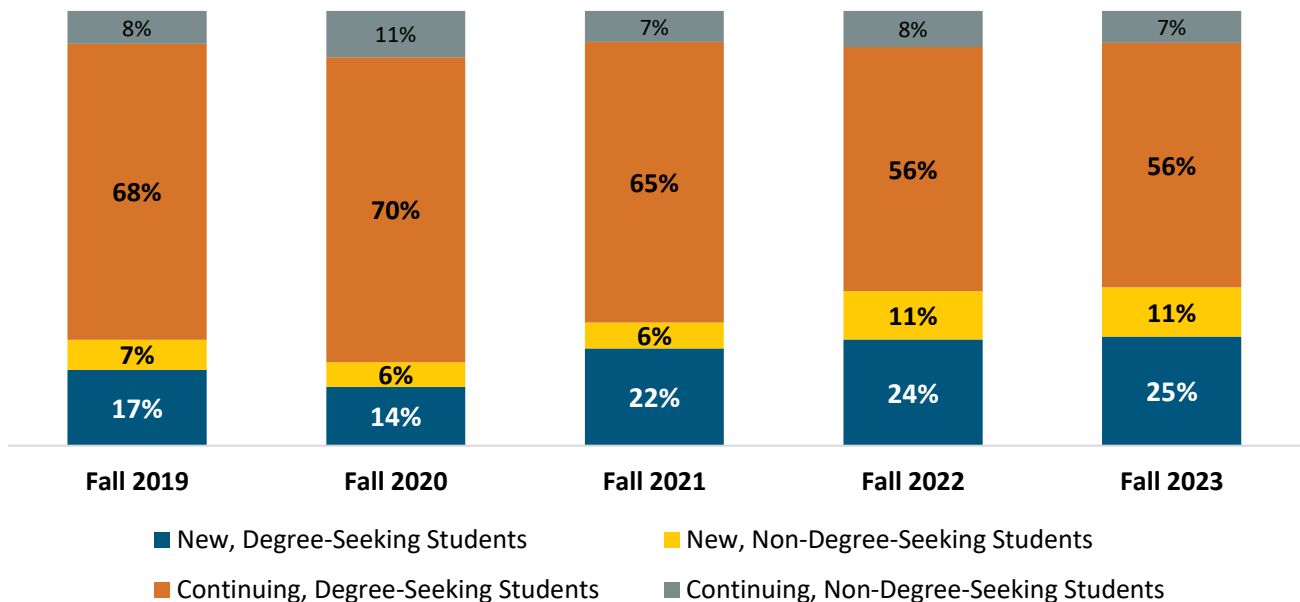
## HEAD COUNT BY STUDENT TYPE

The table below identifies student enrollment by both new and continuing students based on IPEDS enrollment. The largest proportion of students in each term is continuing, degree-seeking students, which constitutes over two-thirds of all students.

The proportion of new students to continuing students is increasing. For example, in Fall 2019, new degree seeking students made up 17% of enrollment, compared to 24% in Fall 2022 and Fall 2023. The percentage of degree-seeking continuing students, 56% in Fall 2023, has declined from 68% in Fall 2019.

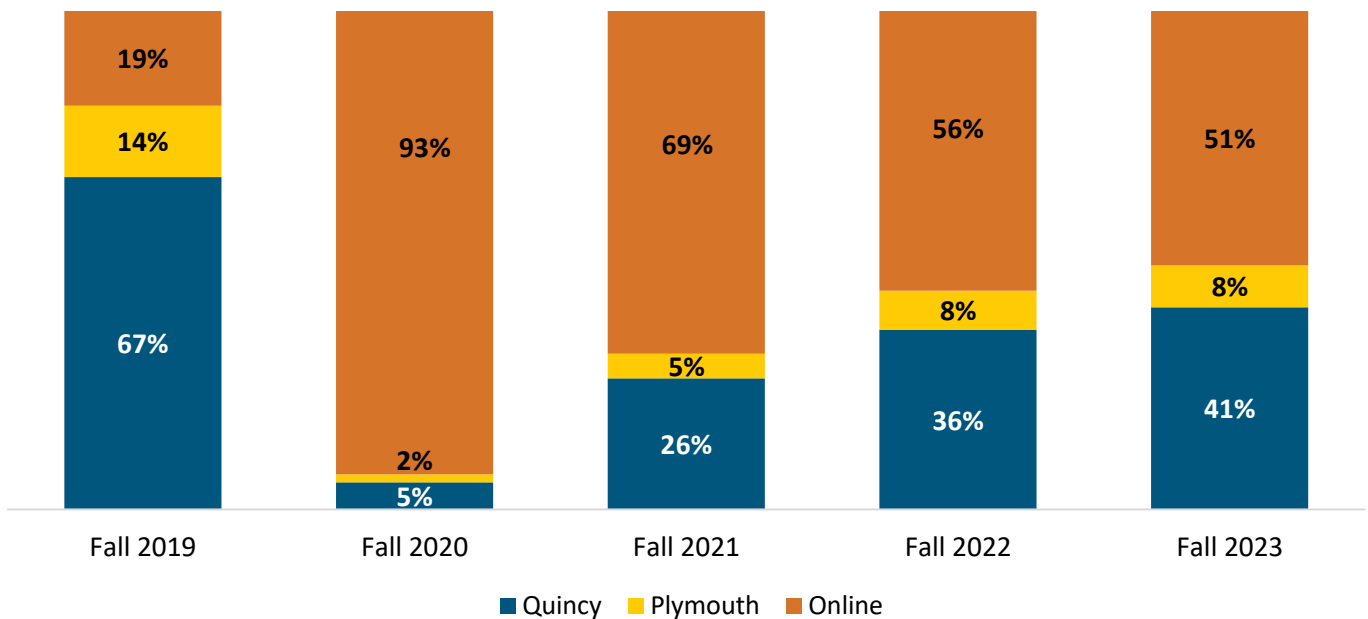
## DUPLICATED HEAD COUNT BY CAMPUS

The charts below demonstrate changes in enrollment and credits generated by modality since fall 2019. Prior to the pandemic, in fall 2019, the Quincy campus generated 7% of credits, Plymouth 14% of credits, and online courses 19% of credits. This shifted markedly during the pandemic. In fall 2020, for example, 93% of credits generated were from online courses, with a smaller percentage from Quincy (5%) and from Plymouth (2%).

Each semester since, students have returned to classes, with a greater percentage of credits generated from on campus courses. In fall 2023, the credits generated between online and on campus was evenly split: 51% online, 41% Quincy, and 8% Plymouth. Note that dual enrollment, Early College High School, and others, are not included.

**Percentage of Total Credits By Campus**



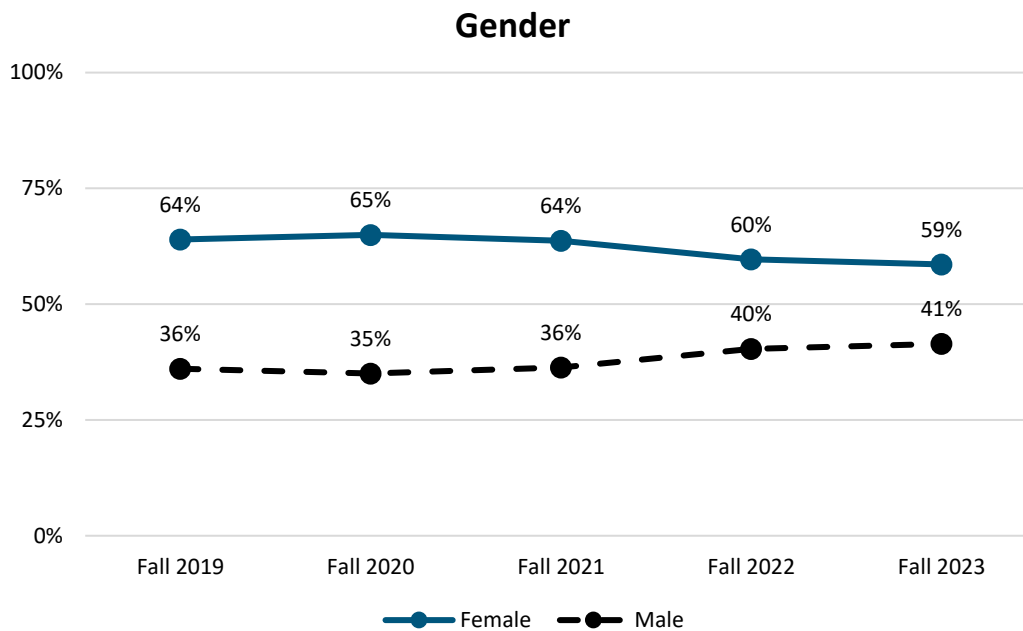

## HEAD COUNT BY GENDER

Similar to other community colleges, women outnumber men in enrollment. In fall 2021, 64% of enrolled students identified as female, and 36% identified as male. There is evidence that the gap is narrowing in terms of enrollment starting Fall 2022. In Fall 2023, 59% of students identified as women and 41% identified as men.

Note that Fall 2022 and Fall 2023 do not include the students who identify as other, 19 and 23 respectively.

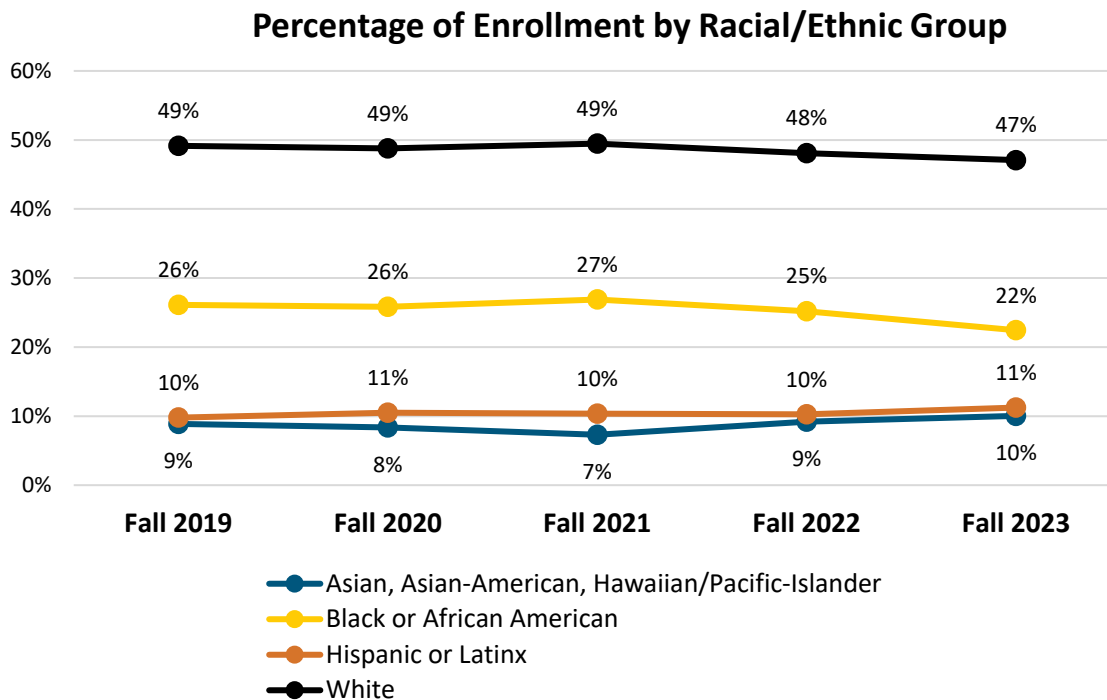


## HEAD COUNT BY RACE/ETHNICITY

During the admissions and enrollment process, students identify themselves according to IPEDS race and ethnicity categories. Among students with a known or reported ethnicity in Fall 2023, 47% of students identified as White, 22% as Black/African American, 11% as Hispanic, and 10% as Asian.

As noted below, these trends shift over time. For example, the percentage of students identifying as Black/African-American declined from 27% in Fall 2021 to 22% in Fall 2023.

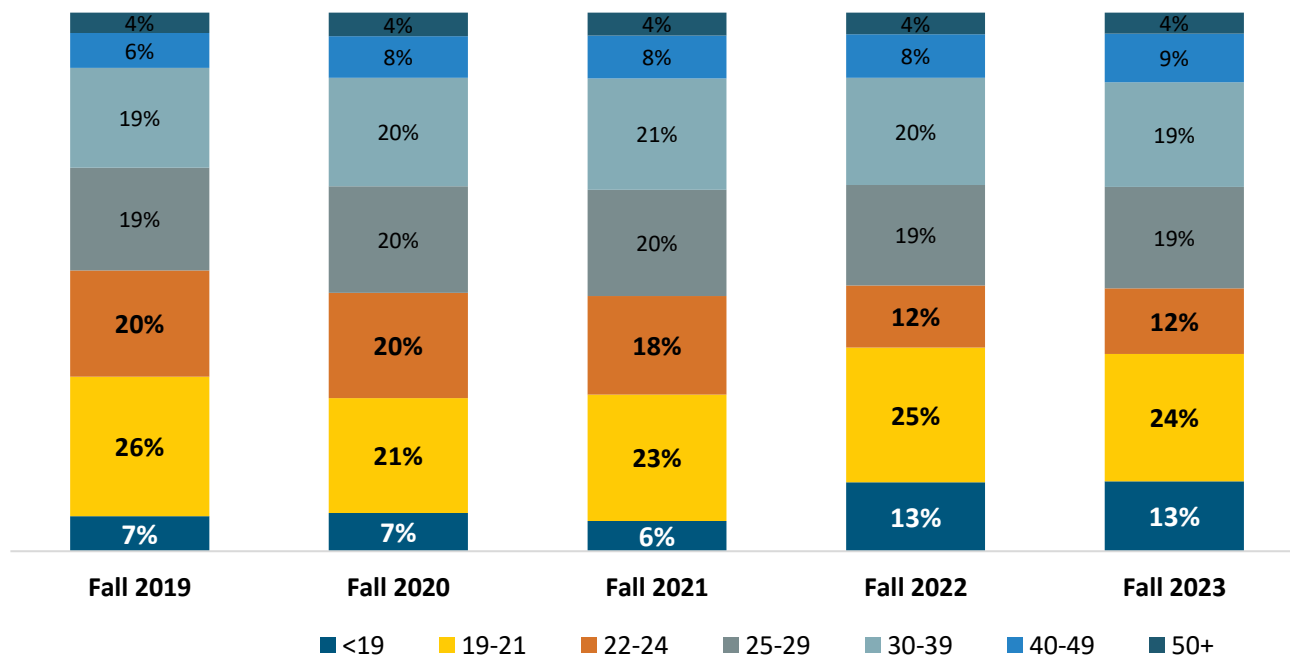
## HEAD COUNT BY AGE GROUP

Students between the ages of 19 and 21 make up the largest age group with 24% of the student population. Growth areas over time include students under 19, from 6% of the student population in Fall 2019 to 9% of the student population in Fall 2023.

Age groups experiencing decline include the 22 to 24 age year group that made up 20% of the population in Fall 2019 and 12% of the population in Fall 2023.

## Distribution of Enrollment by Enrollment Type



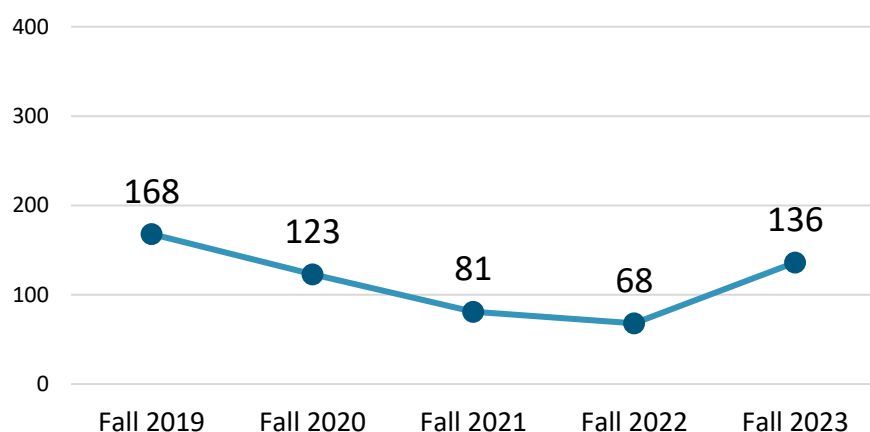

## INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS

In fall 2023, Quincy College enrolled 136 international students on F-1 Visas, representing 43 countries. This is a 97% increase from fall 2022; and the highest since Fall 2020. Top countries are Indian, Vietnam, China, and Brazil. The numbers coming from India have doubled since Fall 2019; whereas the number from China have decreased by 64%.

**International Student Enrollment by Country (with at Least Five Students)**

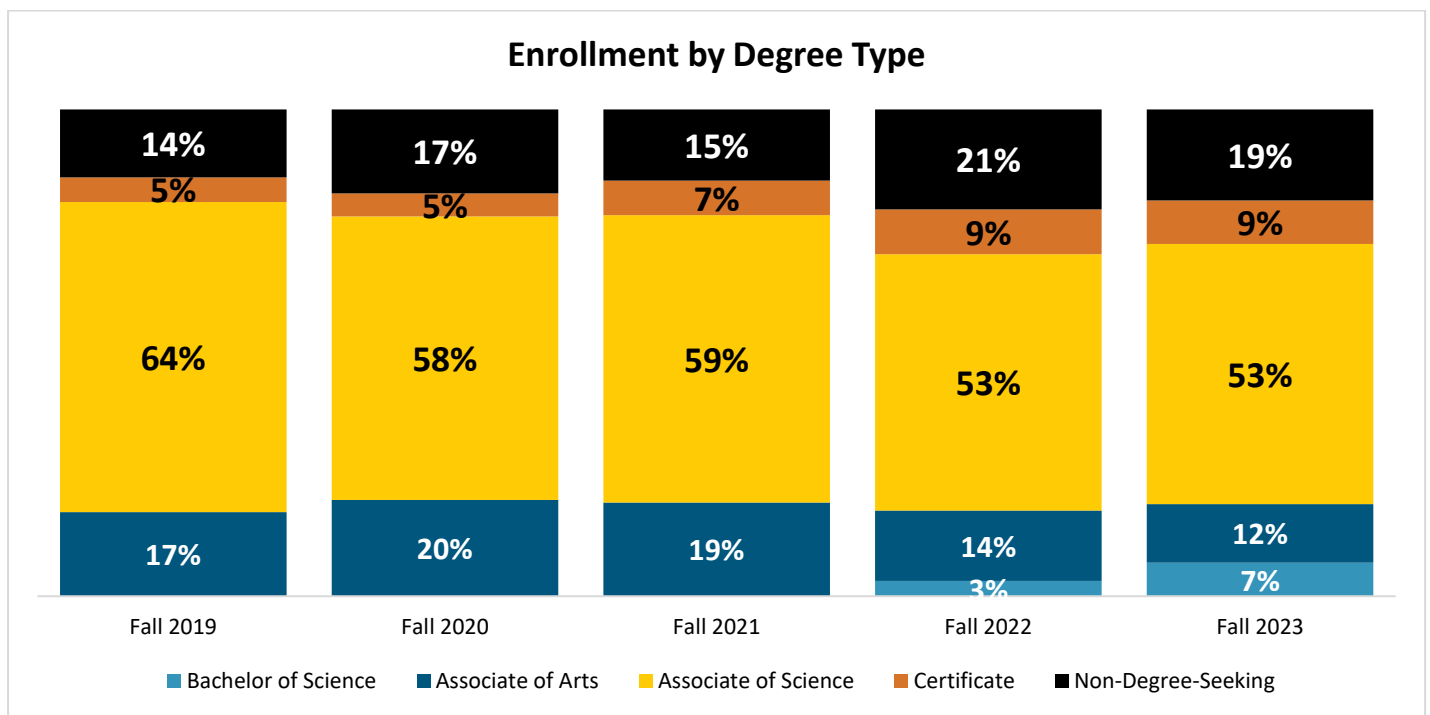

## HEAD COUNT BY DEGREE TYPE

The majority of students at Quincy College declare their intention to earn a degree or certificate, while the split varies over time. The percentage of students seeking a certificate has increased from 5% (Fall 2019) to 9% (Fall 2023). As of Fall 2023, baccalaureate-degree seeking students make up 7% of the population.

## HEAD COUNT BY PROGRAM

A total of 3,202 students were enrolled at QC by the end of fall 2023, 2125 of which sought a degree or certificate. Top associate programs in fall 2023 included: Health Sciences (277), Business Management (142), Business (135), and General Studies (129). The largest baccalaureate program was Business Management, with 121 students, followed by Computer Science (48), and Psychology (37).

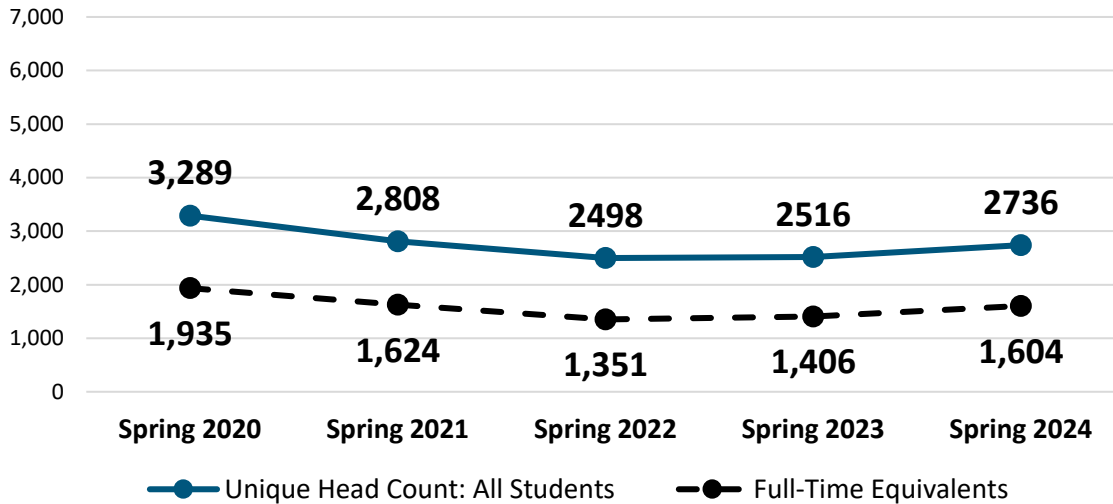

### Overall Spring Head Count & FTE



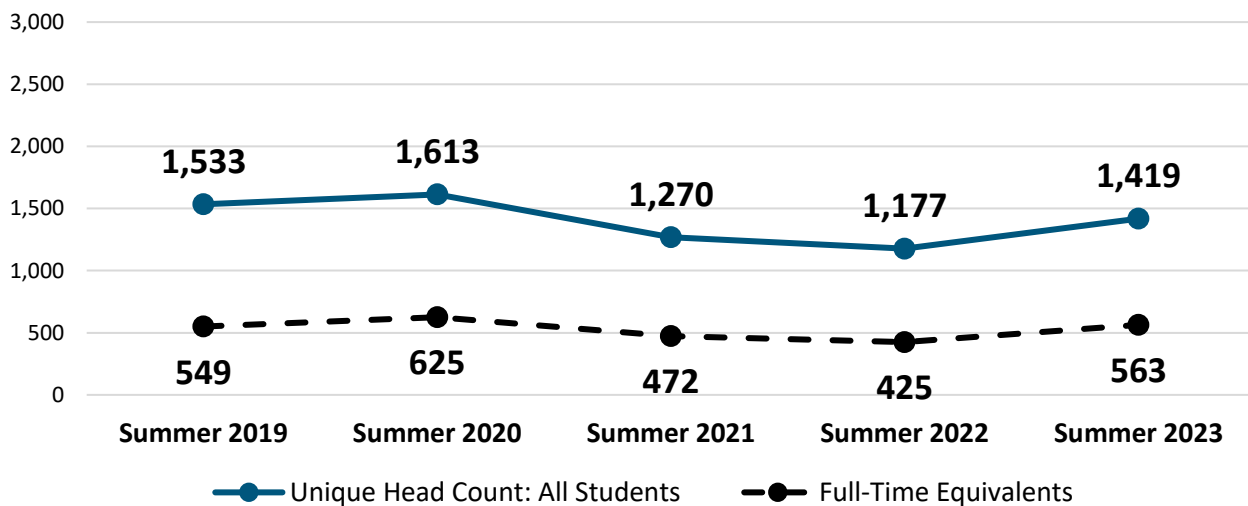

**Overall Summer Head Count & FTE**

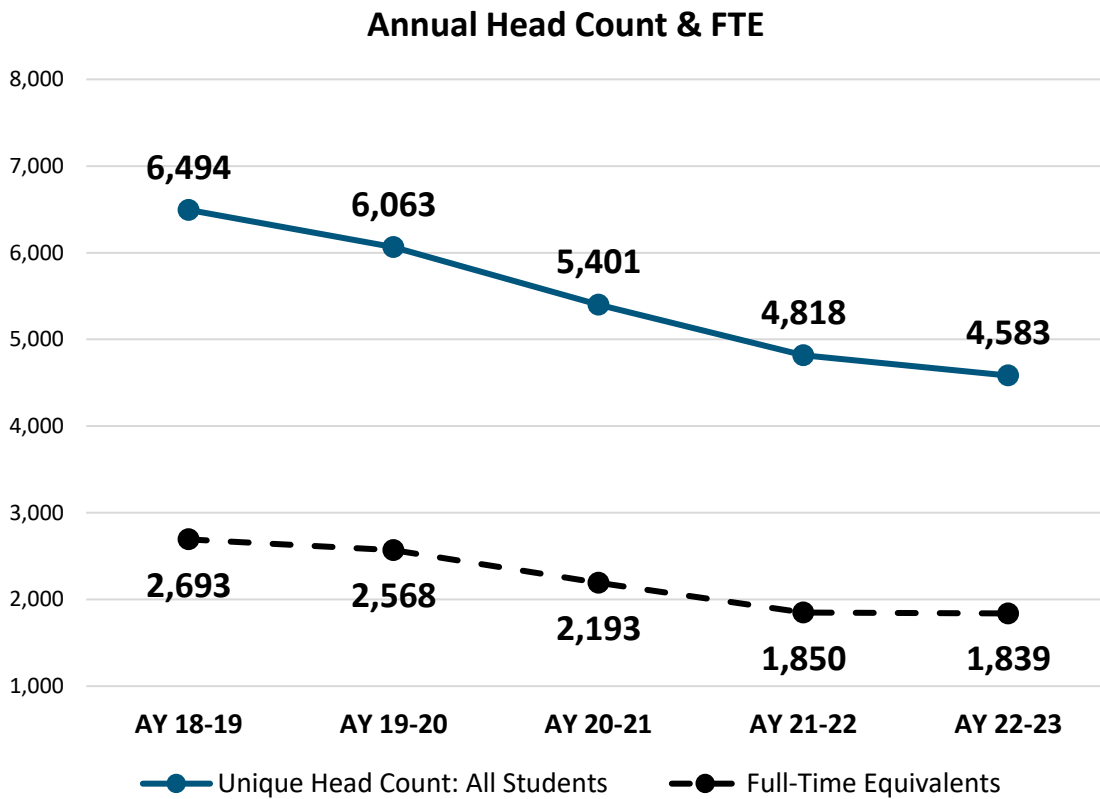

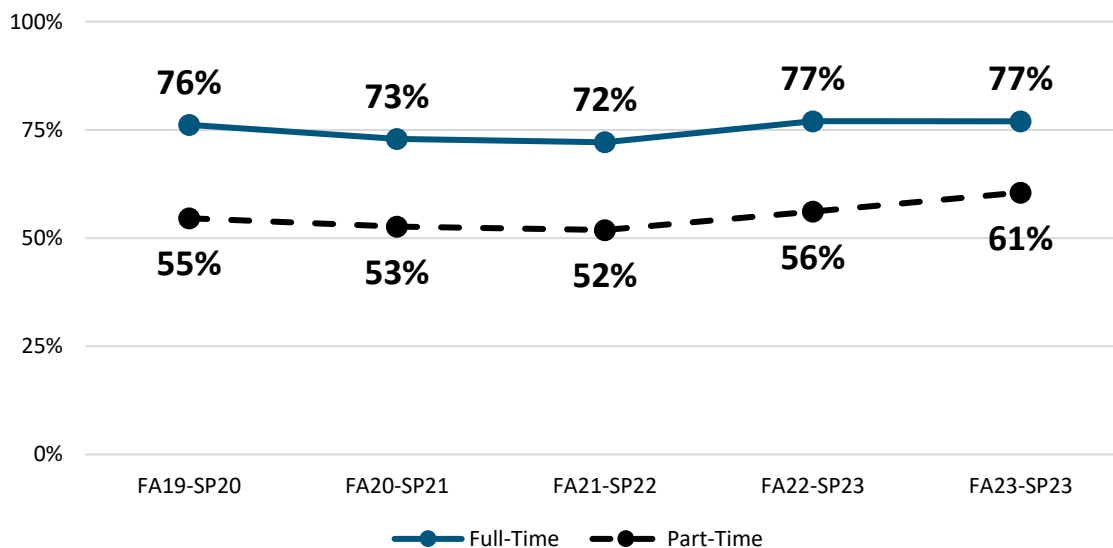

## FALL-TO-SPRING PERSISTENCE: All Students

Persistence rates measure the proportion of students enrolled in the fall semester who persist or re-enroll in the spring semester. Overall persistence fell to a low rate of 60% in the middle of the pandemic (Fall 2020-Spring 2021), increasing most recently to 66% (Fall 2023 to Spring 2024). Full-time students consistently have higher persistence rates than part-time students; however, gains in persistence is evident among part-time students as well (55% to 61%).

Fall-to-Spring Persistence Since Fall 2019



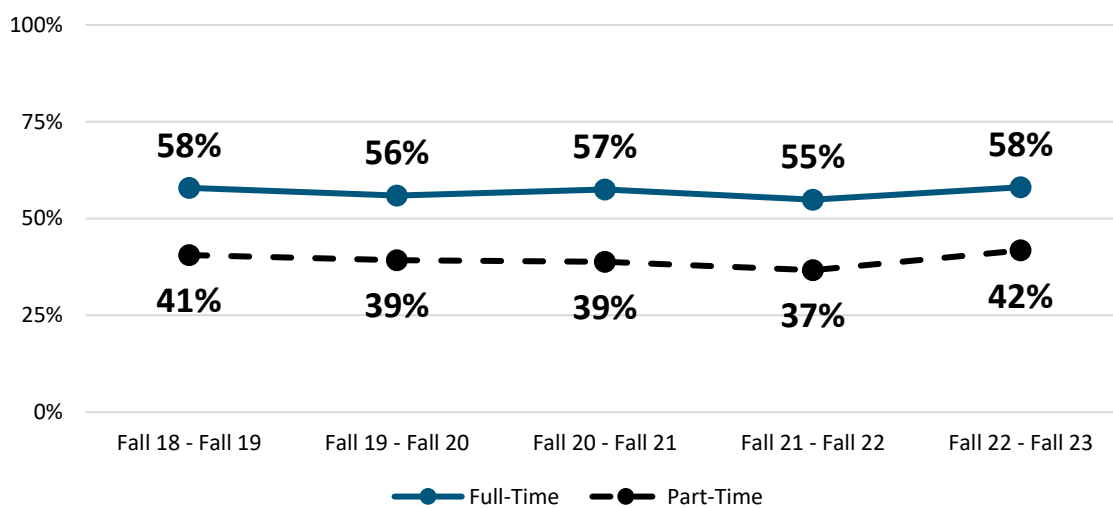

**Combined Retention and Graduation Rates Since Fall 2018**



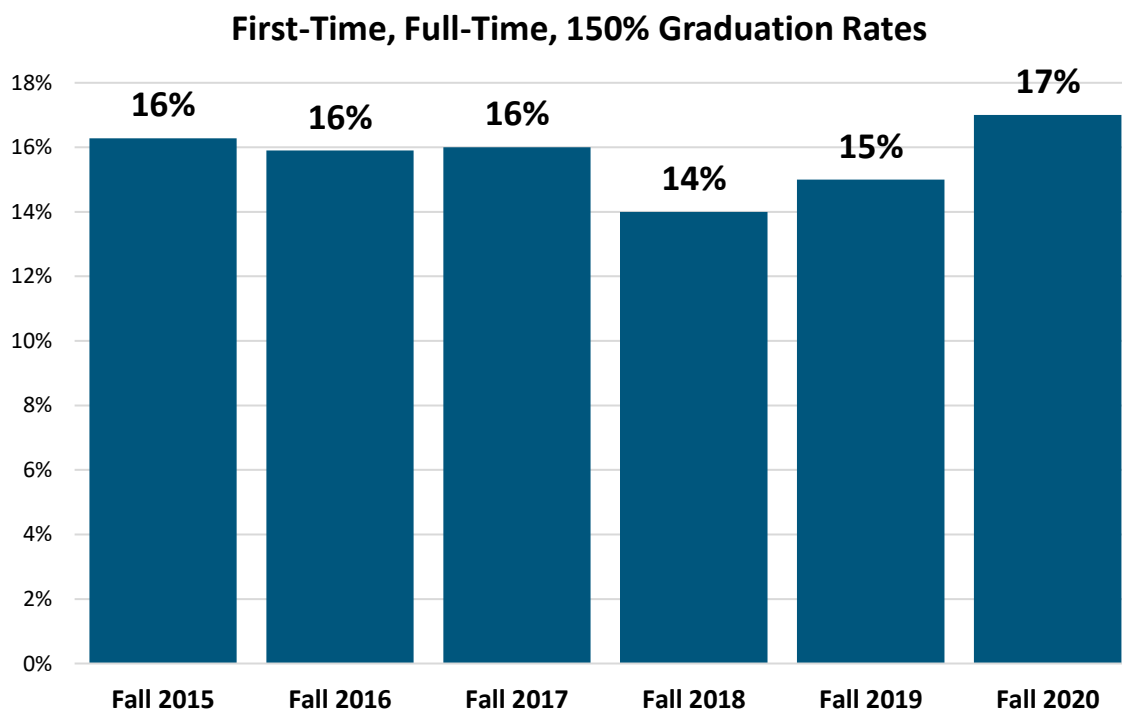

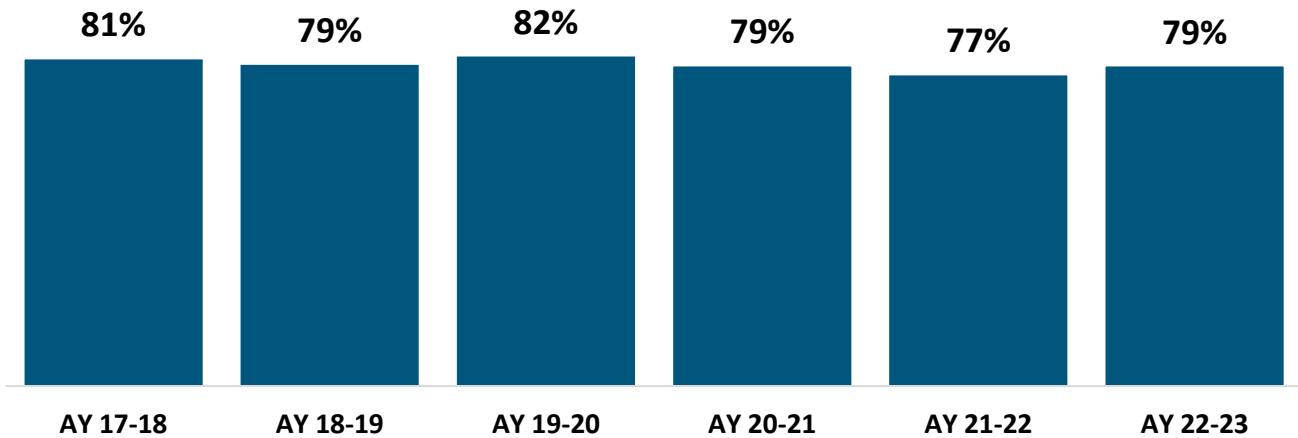

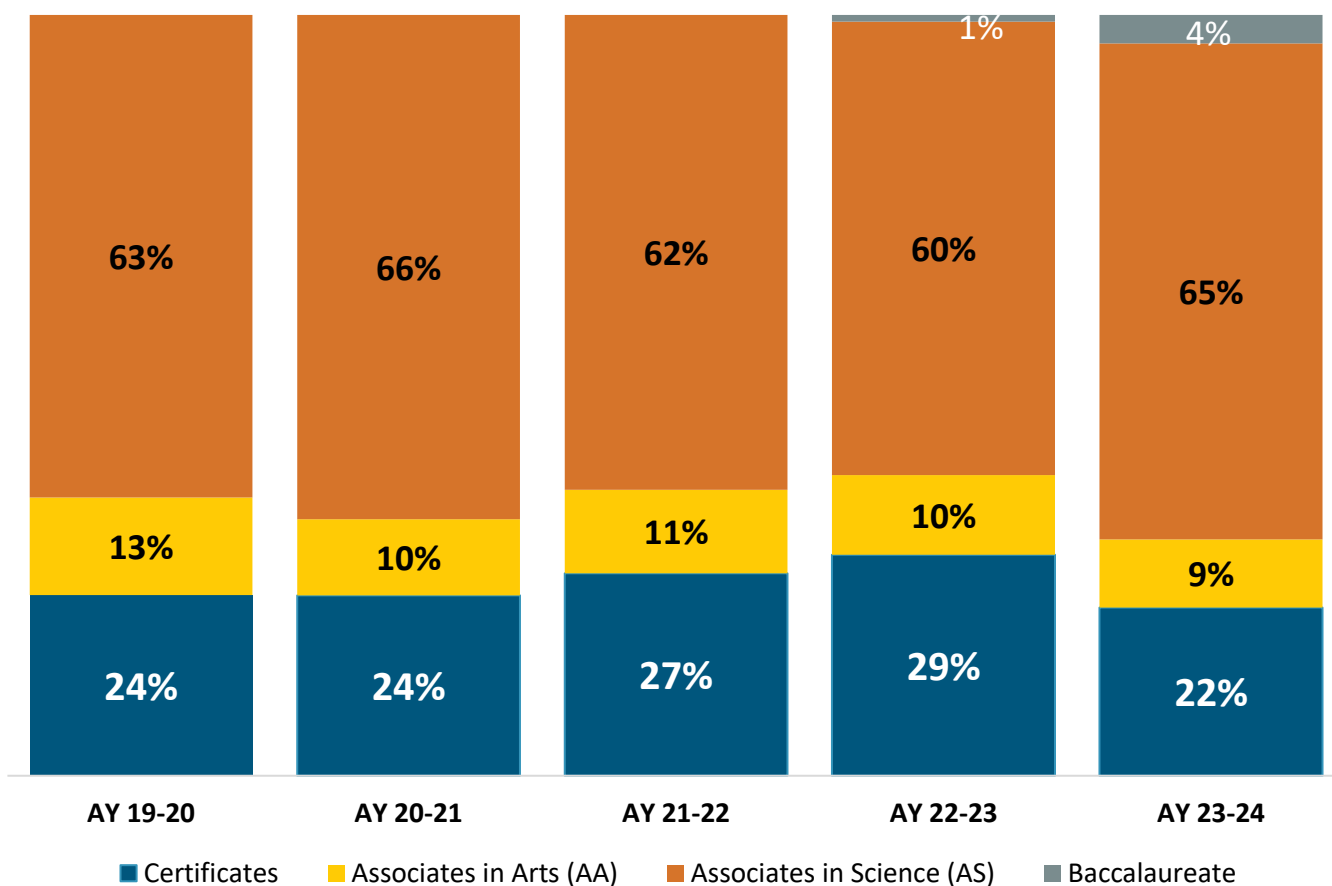
