QC Soccer Rocks in Home Debut

The Quincy College men's soccer team picked the perfect time to live up to its new nickname.

In its historic Sept. 27 home opener, competing in its inaugural National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA) season, the newly named Granite rocked Massachusetts Bay Community College 10-1 before a sparse crowd at Creedon Field in North Quincy.

"It meant everything to me, the team and the QC community," said an elated first year coach Idris Senyonjo about the milestone victory.

"This was a great opportunity to showcase our talent, hard work and dedication to the game and to be able to deliver a 10-1 win was exceptional and a memory that will be cherished throughout the history of this athletic program."

And showcase they did, with no fewer than six players scoring in the rout. Forwards Sayfoulaye Ba and

New \$1.2M Library Provides Improved Learning Pathway

As Quincy College continues to experience record growth in programs, classes, student enrollment and academic stature — with the approval this year of awarding baccalaureate degrees — the focus remains on teaching and learning one student at a time.

Over the summer the college took another giant step in that direction with the major renovation and renaming of the Anselmo Library on the Quincy campus to the Anselmo Learning Commons and Library, which opened at the start of the Fall 2017 semester.

The \$1.2 million facility now provides students with a full-range of

expanded up-to-date resources and services in support of their educational goals.

A year ago, students were greeted by a spacious, new modern-designed student lounge on the third floor of Presidents Place.

This year they returned to find a beautiful new 8,515-square-foot library, more than double the size

QC Kicks Off Inaugural NJCAA Season

This fall Quincy College took another giant step in raising its visibility by beginning play in the National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA), fielding men's teams in both soccer and basketball. They will compete under the school's new nickname of the Granite in the 16-team Massachusetts Community

College Athletic Conference (MCCAC) Region 21.

In earlier years, QC played in the Boston

Small College Conference in basketball, hockey, tennis and golf.

While students have participated in intramural sports the past few years, the move into national intercollegiate sports coincides with QC's continuing

Twould like to welcome everyone back to what promises Lto be an exciting 2017-2018 academic year. As we embark on a new academic year, I find myself looking to the future of Quincy College while embracing our past.

Starting a new semester, I am reminded of the very tenets that Quincy College was founded upon nearly 60 years ago. As an open-access institution that encourages academic achievement and excellence, we are strengthened and empowered by the diversity of our community members, the diversity of ideas discussed in and outside the classroom, and the diversity of our beliefs.

Together, as global citizens and members of a shared community, across our two campuses in Quincy and Plymouth, we have the choice to foster respectful discussion of ideas and opinions, grounded in civility, understanding and tolerance.

Quincy College is in a state of transformation. We continue to expand and innovate our campuses, program offerings — including those leading to 4-year degrees and student activities. We will introduce baccalaureate degrees selectively over time in occupations where the entry-level credential is changing.

On the Quincy campus, we have made many improvements, chief among them the new Anselmo Learning Commons and Library on the third floor of Presidents Place. It will serve not only as a critical space for our students to learn, explore, and understand the world around them but as a community space as well.

The name of the library has changed to encompass "learning commons." This new facility was explicitly designed to maximize the sharing of ideas, discourse, and facilitate learning for every member of our community, with space to accommodate dynamic use.

We've also expanded our footprint in the lower level of Presidents Place, now providing nine new classrooms and a computer lab in the South Tower. They are complimented by a Quiet Study Lounge in the basement and our stunning year-old, third-floor student lounge. These spaces were built in direct response to your feedback on what you need to be a successful student on campus.

In Plymouth, the investment in a SynDaver, a synthetic cadaver used as an interdisciplinary teaching tool, comes on the heels of last year's major 45,000 square-foot renovation and campus expansion, including a state-of-theart Nursing wing and a 950 square-foot simulation laboratory, where the SynDaver is housed.

This fall, we started a new Athletics Program, joining the National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA), to offer competitive intercollegiate sports to students. We have initially launched men's soccer and basketball teams — playing under the new nickname of the Quincy College Granite — and plan to expand to women's soccer and basketball in 2018.

Quincy College remains steadfast in continuing to provide exemplary student experiences in and out of the classroom, forging opportunities for athletic and academic success.

In our new campus space and throughout your studies, I encourage you to explore and celebrate our diversity of ideas, opinions, and life experiences and utilize them to drive respectful discourse and dialogue throughout the semester.



Planning to Transfer? Here Are Some Tips

y now most of you are starting to Defeel comfortable with the Fall 2017 semester here at Quincy College. Those September new school-year jitters for freshmen, returnees and other newcomers have started to wear off. You know what your classes and teachers are like, how much studying is required, where you can go for a bite to eat or relax between classes and you're accustomed to seeing familiar faces around campus.

But for those graduating in December or next May and continuing their education that comfort zone will

soon give way to a new set of anxieties as you think about your future and transferring to another school.

Transferring schools can be overwhelming. But fear not. The advising office here at QC is here to help. Start by visiting the office on the 5th floor of Presidents Place to answer any questions or concerns.

Here are some other tips to follow:

 Keep an eye out for various events here at QC throughout the school year, like the Transfer Fair in October or occasional pop-up college recruiting visits, where you can meet various representatives from area schools about transfer admissions.

— Do your homework and research transfer friendly schools and make a list of where you'd like to apply. If possible, try and visit those campuses to get a firsthand feel because some schools might not be as appealing as they appear online.

- Familiarize yourself well in advance of transfer requirements. Some schools may accept most of a student's credits, others may take fewer. Some may require a certain GPA or SAT/ACT score. And make sure if you're applying to a specialized program — ie. Engineering or Nursing - you've taken the required prerequisite courses.

Students with Special Needs Can Find Help at SAS

ver the summer, Quincy College may have renamed its Disability Services department to Student Accessibility Services (SAS) but it still wants everyone to know: We're here for you.

The SAS provides services of all kinds to students with a wide variety of disabilities and needs, ranging from accessibility, vision and hearing problems to extra test time, a distraction-free environment and anything else in between.

Since the start of the Fall 2017 semester, SAS, located in Room 325 of Presidents Place, has currently been working with about 130 students.

"Usually, by the end of the semester, I end up working with 300," says second-year SAS Coordinator Pete Luizzi, accounting for a little more than 15 percent of the student enrollment.

Luizzi, with more than 10 years experience in special education, and Cynthia Chapman, his counterpart on the Plymouth campus, work with each student individually to ensure that each is accommodated to the best of his/her and the college's ability.

"Come see us often and early on in the semester." says Luizzi, adding that the biggest mistake students make is

waiting too long into the semester


before reaching our and seeking accommodations.

"[Students who wait] get really stressed out, and they aren't sure where to go from there," he says. "But if they came to see me in August or the beginning of

September, it would be a different story."

Anyone is welcome to seek help at any point in the semester but being diligent and maintaining a relationship with Luizzi or Chapman makes the road a lot easier.

After all, the goal of SAS, is help students on their educational journey and they are there for you.



Winter 2018 Graduation Deadline Oct. 27

The Registrar's Office is now accepting the Winter 2018 Intent to ■ Graduate Applications. Students may submit the application in person at the Registrar's Office in both Quincy & Plymouth or online through the Quincy College Portal. A \$150 fee per program is required at the time of the application submission. The deadline for the application submission is Oct. 27, 2017. Students may submit the application after Oct 27, but will be subject to a \$75 late fee and additional consequences. — Also be aware of various application deadlines, especially if you're eligible for Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). You don't want to miss out.

While academic achievement and good grades are important, 4-year schools also take other factors into consideration. For those with less than stellar grades, being a well-rounded student may help make up for those deficits.

So think about taking diverse courses, joining extracurricular clubs or submitting a unique application essay to stand out from other transferring applicants.

And don't be afraid to take chances. If you've always thought about an Ivy League school, and think you may have a shot...apply. Don't forget to look into scholarship opportunities, especially those for transfer students. What do you have to lose?

Remember, doing your research, staying organized and planning ahead are the keys for a successful transfer.

So stay calm and don't stress. Good luck.

(4,230 square feet) of the old one that was often difficult to find in a corridor of classrooms that were torn down and relocated in the South Tower of Presidents Place.

Now conveniently located around the corner from the third floor PP elevators, the new library's open concept design and large windows provide for a well-lit, spacious area that you can feel comfortable working in.

In the Spring of 2015, long before construction began, focus groups of students and faculty were asked for their feedback on the needs and wants for the new library.

Throughout those meetings, most agreed the one pressing issue the older, smaller library could not provide was a calm and quiet place to study.

That problem was solved with the construction of four new study rooms and one conference room that have been an

immediate success.

"Just in the first few weeks," said Susan Whitehead, Director of Library Services, "the conference and study rooms have been reserved for over 200 hours."

In addition, the library tripled the amount of individual study seats, with space available at one of the study tables that line the right side of the

facility, along with nine "soft seats" and the new laptop bar.

With the college's improved technology, there are now multiple computers throughout the library's new common area, separated by dividers, ensuring that you can concentrate on your work without distraction.

The renovated computer lab now holds more than 30 computers, all equipped with new touch-screen monitors.

All of this is a clear sign of QC's continuing quest to create a "hub of learning" that all students can and will benefit from.

And, as Whitehead added, the new library's goal is to become a place that fosters "all types of learning, not just books."

Choice of Granite Rock-Solid Nickname

Let's Go Granite! That's the new nickname Quincy College chose over the summer for its men's soccer and basketball teams in their first year of competition in the National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA).

More than 200 names were submitted by students, faculty and staff last spring, and the winning entry to be used by all future teams was voted upon by the college's Board of Governors.

Quincy, known as the "City of Presidents," is the birthplace of two U.S. presidents — John Adams and his son John Quincy Adams — as well as John Hancock, a President of the Continental Congress and the first signer of the Declaration of Independence.

So, why Granite?

Historically, Quincy also was home to a thriving granite industry, with more than 50 granite quarries exporting the massive hard and tough stone throughout the nation and made stonecutting the city's principal economic activity.

QC will retain its Jaguar mascot
— one used in earlier years when
teams competed in the Boston Small
College Conference — and the
school's colors are blue and white,
with gold accents.

Joao Carvalho led the way each with a hat trick while Derek Andrade, Chike Okonkwo, Herby Milien and Dave Dumersier added solo goals.

In one game, the Granite doubled their scoring output in their first four outings to improve to 2-3 on the 10-game season, which ends Oct. 21 at Holyoke CC.

"When you are putting together a new team it is challenging to get all the players on the same page, getting along and building camaraderie," Senyonjo said. "That said, these young men have surpassed my expectations with how quickly they have embraced my philosophy and coaching model and grown as a team and individuals.

"I'm hoping to build momentum off this historic home win to finish out our

season strong, and I believe I have the right group of boys to achieve that."

Senyonjo, a native of Uganda, brings a solid soccer pedigree

solid soccer pedigree *Coach Senyonjo* to QC. He played semi-pro soccer for Express FC and, after moving to the United States in 2009 to study Biology at UMass Boston, he shifted from playing to coaching in 2012. He has coached several youth levels, including the U19 Mass Youth District 2 team, the U18 Girls and U12 Boys teams for America FC United based in Quincy.

growth in academics, student enrollment and physical expansion.

"As the intramural program grew, many of our students requested that we participate in competitive sports," said Susan Bossa, the Associate Vice President of Student Development. "We listened to our students and with the support from the administration, Quincy College joined the NJCAA."

In June, Josh Motroni, a
Weymouth native with 16 years of
high school and college coaching
experience was hired as the new
Athletic Director to lead this
inaugural sports program. But in late
September, Motroni had to step
down because of family health
issues.

"We want to thank Josh for all his work in the short time he was here to

help get our new athletic program launched." said Bossa, taking over as Interim Athletic Director. "We're sorry to see him leave and wish him and his family well."

Prior to Motroni, QC hired basketball coach Doug Scott, a former Quincy High hoops standout and assistant coach and soccer coach Idris Senyonjo, a Uganda native who played semi-professional soccer for Express FC.

Until a new AD is named, Bossa will also be working with Director of Student Life Amanda Deck, a three-time All-America women's soccer player at the College of Saint Rose in Albany, N.Y.

"While our goal for this first season is to be competitive, we want our team to embody sportsmanship and a love of the game," Bossa said.

Besides their athletic skills, Bossa hopes QC's student athletes will

develop the skills that will carry over after college into the workforce, such as teamwork, time management and a respect for others on and off the field.

In its 10-game season opener Sept. 9, the QC men's soccer team lost 4-0 at Springfield Tech. The team, which practices at nearby Veterans Stadium and plays its home games at Creedon Field in North Quincy, ends its season Oct. 21 at Holyoke CC.

Meanwhile, the basketball team opens its 2017-18 season Nov.7, at Community College of Rhode Island (CCRI) in Warwick, R.I. The team will play its home games at Eastern Nazarene College in Quincy and practice next door at Quincy High School.

QC expects to add teams for women's soccer and basketball next year in the NJCAA, with volleyball, cross country and golf to follow.
