DUAL ENROLLMENT

The partnerships Quincy College has developed with school systems help to make the transition from secondary to postsecondary education seamless. Dual enrollment provides high school students with the opportunity to earn college credit from Quincy College, while they are still in high school. Students save both time and money when they participate in the dual enrollment program, and we encourage interested students to work with their high school guidance office to determine if dual enrollment is right for them.

We have experienced some growth with our dual enrollment population. In FY 2018, we served 408 students. This jumped to 423 dual enrollment students during FY 2019 academic year. Additionally, the number of dual enrollment courses has steadily increased from 48 courses in FY 2018, then rising to 57 courses in FY 2019, and now increasing to 65 for FY 2020. For FY 2020, we will continue dual enrollment partnerships with eight local high schools.

We intend to promote further collaboration between Quincy College and our partner high schools through this pathway program. Through the College's robust student and academic support systems, we are confident that a student's participation in dual enrollment and matriculation to Quincy College will help set them up for further academic and professional success.

Quincy College has a strong partnership with the Quincy Public Schools (QPS). In addition to the dual enrollment courses at both Quincy and North Quincy High Schools, Quincy College also offers professional development opportunities for QPS dual enrollment instructors and is in the process of creating programs for QPS parents to visit the College and learn more about the opportunities that are available to their students. Given our close proximity to the high schools we have been able to fully engage the students, families, and Quincy community in the College's dual enrollment initiatives.

HIGH SCHOOL RECRUITMENT

The Office of Admissions recruits from a variety of populations. With the shift in local demographics, recruitment strategies are deployed to maintain enrollment. The partnerships with local high schools are strengthened to provide a seamless transition from high school to college.

The table below lists enrollment by the top twenty high schools for students new to Quincy College. In Fall 2019, the largest number of students came from Weymouth High School. This is a shift from previous years when most new high school graduates were from Quincy High School.

The percentage of students testing into either developmental English or developmental math was 95%; 79% tested into both developmental English and developmental Math.



FALL ENROLLMENT: HEAD COUNT AND FULL TIME EQUIVALENT STUDENTS

Student enrollment decreased 29% between Fall 2014 and Fall 2019. This constitutes a decrease of over 33% from an all-time high Fall enrollment in Fall 2017 of 5,343 students. The number of Full-Time Equivalents (FTEs) decreased from Fall 2014 to Fall 2019 by 31%. One FTE is equal to 15 credits.

The table below identifies student enrollment by both new and continuing students. The largest proportion of students in each term is continuing, degree-seeking students, which constitutes over two-thirds of all students.



Percentage of Total Credits by Course Time




DUPLICATED HEAD COUNT BY CAMPUS

Percentage of Total Credits By Campus




HEAD COUNT BY CREDIT LOAD STATUS

Percentage of Full-time and Part-time Students




HEAD COUNT BY GENDER

Gender Composition




HEAD COUNT BY RACE/ETHNICITY

Racial and Ethnic Composition (Fall 2014 - Fall 2019)




ENROLLMENT GAP: STUDENTS OF COLOR AND WHITE STUDENTS

Between Fall 2014 and Fall 2019, the proportion of students of color at Quincy College has increased from 37% to 46%. Fall 2017 and 2018 saw no enrollment gap between students of color and White students, while White students enrolled at slightly higher rates (47%) than students of color (46%) in Fall 2019.


Students of Color Enrollment Gap



The proportion of Black or African-American students has stayed relatively consistent at about 25% from Fall 2015 – Fall 2018. The proportion of Hispanic or Latinx students has increased from 6% in Fall 2014 to 9% in Fall 2019, and was at an all-time high of 10% of enrolled students in Fall 2019. Asian students have historically comprised about 7% of the student body, but has increased to 9% of students in Fall 2019.

Enrollment Breakdown by Race/Ethnic Subgroup




HEAD COUNT BY AGE GROUP

Age Group Composition (Fall 2014 - Fall 2019)




INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS

International (F1- Visa) Students




HEAD COUNT BY DEGREE OR CERTIFICATE SOUGHT

The percentage of students seeking an Associate Degree has decreased slightly from 81% in Fall 2014 to 78% in Fall 2019. The proportion of students seeking an Associate of Arts degree has declined during this time (from 20% to 19%), while the proportion of students seeking an Associate of Science degree has increased from 51% to 59%. The proportion of students seeking a Certificate has stayed relatively consistent at about 7%, while the proportion of non-degree-seeking students has increased from 12% in Fall 2014 to 15% in Fall 2019.






Overall Summer Head Count & FTE




ANNUAL ENROLLMENT: UNDUPLICATED CREDIT STUDENT HEAD COUNT



FALL-TO-SPRING PERSISTENCE

Persistence rates measure the proportion of students enrolled in the Fall semester who persist or reenroll in the Spring semester. Overall persistence has declined over a five-year period from 69% for the Fall 2014 cohort to 62% for the Fall 2019 cohort. Full-time students consistently have higher persistence rates than part-time students, though both groups have seen an overall decrease in persistence rates since Fall 2014. Additionally, the gap between part-time and full-time student persistence rates has widened from 18 percentage points in Fall 2014 (80% vs. 62%) to 21 percentage points in Fall 2019 (76% vs. 55%).

Fall-to-Spring Persistence Since Fall 2014




FALL-TO-FALL RETENTION

Retention rates measure the proportion of students enrolled in a given Fall semester who are enrolled or who have graduated by the following Fall term. Retention rates below are for all students. Though retention rates have decreased from 55% for the Fall 2014 cohort to 51% for the Fall 2018 cohort, retention rates have increased four percentage points from a low of 47% in Fall 2017. Similar to persistence rates, full-time students consistently have higher retention rates when compared to part-time students. The gap between part-time and full-time student retention rates has widened from a 9 percentage point gap in Fall 2014 (61% vs. 52%) to an 18 percentage point gap in Fall 2018 (62% vs. 44%).

Retention Rates Since Fall 2014 (All Students)




IPEDS GRADUATION RATE

Each year Quincy College calculates the number of first-time-in-college, full-time, degree-seeking students who graduate within 150% of time and reports this through the Integrated Postsecondary Educational Data System (IPEDS). For an Associate degree-seeking student, this would be three years; for a one-year certificate-seeking student, this would be three semesters. 150% graduation rates increased for cohorts of students beginning in Fall 2011 and Fall 2012, though this graduation rate has fallen 3 percentage points from a high of 19% for the Fall 2012 cohort to 16% for the Fall 2016 cohort.

150% Graduation Rates Among Entering Cohorts




EQUITY GAP: IPEDS GRADUATION RATE BY GENDER

Graduation rates have decreased for females from the Fall 2010 cohort to Fall the 2016 cohort, from 20% to 16%. This is also a seven percentage-point decrease from a seven-year high graduation rate of 23% for the Fall 2013 cohort. During this same time period, male graduation rates have increased from the Fall 2010 cohort rate, from 13% to 15% for the Fall 2016 cohort. The Fall 2014, 2015, and 2016 cohorts saw the gap in graduation rate between male and female students disappear or significantly decrease.

150% Graduation Rates by Gender




ANNUAL SUCCESSFUL CREDIT COMPLETION RATE

The completion rate calculation is inclusive of "Pass" grades. Successful credit completion rates have increased four percentage points from the 2014-2015 academic year to the 2018-2019 academic year. Successful completion rates have stayed relatively consistent at 79% and 80% from academic year 2016-2017 through academic year 2018-2019.


